MR. WILLIAM VINCENT AUSTIN HODGE

PATRON

Mr. William Vincent Austin Hodge is a long-standing and celebrated icon with 48 years of unwavering service in the field of education at the local, national, regional, and international levels. In the Federation of St. Kitts-Nevis, particularly in St. Kitts, where the majority of those years have been served, he is acclaimed for his deep commitment to excellence in teaching and learning, for his strict disciplinary practices; for his dynamic, efficient, visionary, and transformative leadership; his astute planning and task completion; his adeptness at problem-solving; and for championing the cause of underprivileged children, especially those coming from lower- income households.

His career in education began in 1974 at the Sandy Point Junior School where he taught as an untrained Grade Five teacher for two years before pursuing a two-year course of Professional training as a full-time trainee at the then St. Kitts-Nevis Teachers Training College. Upon graduating in 1978, he assumed responsibility as a trained Grade Six Teacher at the Verchilds All-aged School for one year, before his placement at the Sandy Point Junior School in 1979.



There, he taught Grade Six for three years (1979-1983) and transitioned smoothly into the post of Deputy Head Teacher of the Sandy Point Primary School to which it was later renamed. His uncompromising service as a teacher was punctuated only by developmental pursuits to acquire higher qualifications, first at the University of Edinburgh, Scotland where he graduated in 1991 with a Bachelor of Education in Educational Management and Administration (with First Class Honours), and in 2006 at the George Mason University in Virginia with a Master of Education in Curriculum and Instruction.

From 1986 onwards, he made his mark at a higher level of school leadership in several capacities. They include Head Teacher of the St. Paul's Primary School (1986-89), and Principal of his alma mater, the Sandy Point High School (1991-2000). Not only was he one of the longest serving Principals to date, but he also made his mark as the first former student to have served in this capacity. While Principal, he earned the community-ascribed title of Mr. Clark for his strict exercise of discipline and his unmatched ability to promote a culture of school excellence, accountability, and transparency in teacher performance, which dramatically transformed the Sandy Point High School in record time. Under his leadership, the Sandy Point High School received the top CXC results for most of his nine-year tenure; won eight (8) consecutive National Inter-school Athletic Championships; and won several national debating championships. Further, the number of students entering Sixth Form grew from a mere two (2) in 1991 to approximately 30 in 2000, and a yearly average of 20 entrants. Under his leadership, Sandy Point High School won its first National Talented Teen pageant in 1995. He also exercised his leadership by championing the cause for teenage mothers to return to school — a privilege that is well enjoyed by teenage mothers today.

Mr. Hodge's vast experience has spread to other countries, having served as a teacher of English Literature in the British Virgin Islands (BVI) (2000-2002); Tutor in the BVI's In-service Teacher Training Programme; Grade Six teacher at various Middle Schools in the State of Maryland, USA; Reading Instructor at Anne Arundel Community College in the State of Maryland (2005-2016).

This education icon is also credited for his pioneering work and outstanding contributions to various educational initiatives over the years in the areas of Teacher Training, Test and Measurement, as well as Schools National Independence celebrations. His highest ascension to leadership in education was in the substantive post of Permanent Secretary Education, which he held from 2016 up to his official retirement in October 2022.

This revered son of the Kittitian soil is hailed as a man of ideas, a stickler for 'class acts', a motivator and role model. He makes no bones in declaring his pride as a Sandy Pointer and community activist. He is on the records as a past President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the Sandy Point Benevolent Society and remains an active and committed member to this very day. It was during his tenure as President that the inaugural SPBS Gala was held in 2011. Mr. Hodge is a devoted Christian and an avid worker in the Methodist Church community in the Federation. He is exceptionally proud to extend his distinguished patronage to the 2023 SPBS Gala.



SENATOR DR. JOYELLE TRIZIA CLARKE

KEYNOTE SPEAKER

The Honourable Senator Dr. Joyelle Trizia Clarke, Minister of Sustainable Development, Environment, Climate Action and Constituency Empowerment is easily described as a Climate Action advocate, defender of youth involvement in decision-making, and a climate and gender justice activist. Professionally, she became one of the youngest women to become a Director of a government office, namely, the Department of Constituency Empowerment, in 2012.

Shortly thereafter, Dr. Joyelle Clarke worked as an educator, bridging her passion for environment and youth together under the banner of one of the strongest youth-led environmental programs in St Kitts and Nevis. Dr. Clarke has been involved in Social Impact Assessments and sustainable livelihoods research for over 15 years. During this time, she has led projects on livelihoods-transition, conducted research and developed programs in various capacities as a government official and community activist.



Her key livelihoods research focused on assessing the transition through re-tooling and re-skilling of former female sugar workers to tourism and agricultural livelihoods, post-sugar production in St Kitts. These, she feels were and continue to be necessary assets for succeeding in new tourism-based livelihoods, for example, the Capisterre Women for Development Group. Moreover, the Honourable Minister's project-related work ranges from livelihood support, community-based development initiatives, sustainable tourism, and environmental conservation. She was engaged in developing and executing community-based projects in collaboration with community groups on behalf of the Government of St. Kitts and Nevis. Projects included climate change initiatives such as reforestation programs, and the establishment of school-based agricultural programs. She has been intimately involved in the work of female farm cooperatives, assisting with the transition from traditional farming to environmentally friendly, climate resilient farming methods.

In addition, Senator Clarke has co-founded a Mentorship Program called, "Women Empowering Girls". She serves as a mentor in Girls Care Jamaica and is the Co-founder of Relate Consultancy, a consultancy firm that assists companies and communities to shape mutually beneficial relationships. Fittingly, the town of Sandy Point, with its academic fabric has clothed this giant, in her own right, from the Sandy Point Preschool to the Sandy Point Primary School, and finally, to the Sandy Point High School. Her hard work over the years, passion and dedication have now transitioned to this period of public service, as she holds the title of Minister of Sustainable Development, Environment, Climate Action, and Constituency Empowerment. A portfolio aligned with her lifelong passion, training, and advocacy.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE IN BUSINESS

CORRIS "ZILEY" DOUGLAS

Corris "Ziley" Douglas, a name synonymous with unwavering dedication to community betterment and philanthropy, was born and raised in the Town of Sandy Point, St. Kitts-Nevis. With humble beginnings that shaped his character, Ziley's "can-do" attitude has transformed challenges into boundless opportunities, not only for himself but for his family, friends, and the entire town of Sandy Point.

Born in 1970 in the village of SOHO, Sandy Point, Ziley was recognized early on as a young leader destined to make a difference in his community. His reputation as a "doer and a giver" began to take root during his early years at Sandy Point Primary and Secondary schools. He was not only academically inclined but also a phenomenal athlete, excelling in Track and Field, football, volleyball, and basketball. In 1987, he held the Sandy Point High School "Class 1" Boys high jump record.



After graduating from high school, Mr. Douglas felt a strong call to serve his country and embarked on a career in law enforcement by joining the Royal St. Christopher and Nevis Police Force in 1989. During his decade-long tenure, he stood out in various roles, eventually becoming a part of the prestigious Regional Security System (RSS) team. Ziley's impressive service led to his role as an RSS instructor, where he contributed to the training of over 500 students. Simultaneously, he continued his active involvement in community and philanthropic initiatives, supporting the Police Force and participating in sports and community activities in Sandy Point.

Ziley's community engagement extended to his longstanding membership in the Sandy Point Catholic Church, where he spearheaded numerous fundraising activities and even drove the church bus. He also served as the captain and coach of the Crab Hill Football Team for many years.

In 1999, Mr. Douglas embarked on a new chapter by migrating to the United States of America (USA), where he resided for seven years. During his time in the USA, he remained resolutely committed to the idea of returning home to establish a business that would serve Sandy Point and its surrounding communities effectively and efficiently.

In 2006, Ziley realized this dream when he returned home and, in early 2007, used his own funds to open the now-renowned "E&K Mini Mart" grocery store. This marked the beginning of an incredible success story that continues to inspire. Despite facing challenges and obstacles, Ziley's "can-do" spirit prevailed, driven by his belief that his undertaking was a path to set an example for others and provide a blueprint for future entrepreneurs and small business owners.

Beyond entrepreneurship, Ziley's philanthropic efforts have left an indelible mark on Sandy Point and its residents. He has consistently employed community members in his businesses, generously supported the Sandy Point football and basketball teams, and provided essential supplies to those in need. His dedication reached new heights during the COVID-19 Pandemic when he distributed food vouchers to the unemployed and delivered groceries free of charge to his customers.

In December 2022, Ziley collaborated with ESTAR INITIATIVES, a non-profit organization, to provide \$250.00 food vouchers to 25 families in the Sandy Point community, demonstrating his unwavering commitment to uplifting his community.

Mr. Douglas is also a stellar supporter of the Sandy Point Benevolent Society (SPBS) organization, embodying SPBS's motto of "Giving back so others can move forward." His life's journey stands as a testament to the transformative power of giving back, a legacy that continues to inspire and uplift those fortunate enough to know him.



DISTINGUISHED SERVICE IN EDUCATION

ALEXANDRINA GEORGINA CAESAR

Alexandrina Georgina Caesar, often fondly known as Mrs. Caesar, is a remarkable individual whose life has been marked by unwavering dedication and a profound commitment to the field of education, community service, and her faith. Her extraordinary journey spans over several decades, leaving an indelible mark on the hearts and minds of those she has touched.

Mrs. Caesar's journey, in the field of education, began in 1953 when she received her first appointment as a first-year pupil teacher at the then Sandy Point Elementary School. Her passion for teaching and her steadfast dedication to her students were evident from the start. Over the years, she passed the required examinations with flying colors, earning her status as a Certified Teacher in 1960.



During that year, Mrs. Caesar's dedication and exceptional abilities earned her a place at the prestigious Leeward Island Teachers' College in Antigua, where she excelled with distinction. Armed with newfound knowledge and a deep passion for education, she returned to continue her service, initially at the Newton Ground All Age School and later at the Sandy Point Infants School.

In September 1970, recognizing her dedication and potential impact, Mrs. Caesar was selected to pursue a course of study in slow learners at the Murray House College in Edinburgh, Scotland, where she earned a Diploma in Special Education. Her journey then led her to Dieppe Bay, a challenging yet rewarding experience as the Head Teacher in a then-depressed area. Through hard work, patience, and cooperation with staff and parents, she made a significantly positive impact during her tenure there.

In 1981, Mrs. Caesar was transferred to the Newton Ground Primary School, where she played a pivotal role in establishing a strong Parent-Teachers Association and pioneered the creation of a Pre-School, which has since evolved into a full-fledged Government Pre-School after years of determination and effort. She introduced graduation exercises at the school, marking a significant milestone in the school's history.

Throughout her teaching career, Mrs. Caesar was not only dedicated to her students but also committed to her own professional development. She traveled to various places, including Winnipeg, Barbados, Antigua, and Israel, to participate in training sessions, for the teaching of reading. Her pursuit of knowledge and her desire to be a better educator were evident in her regular involvement during summer vacations, in Reading Workshops for Temporary Teachers that were conducted by the Canadian Organization for Cooperation in Overseas Development (OCOD). One of the most enriching moments in her teaching career was a six-month stay in Israel from 1980 to 1981, where she pursued a course in Early Childhood Education. This experience allowed her to visit biblical sites, adding a profound spiritual dimension to her educational journey.

Beyond her remarkable teaching career, Mrs. Caesar is an active born-again Christian church worker. She currently holds the position of Chairperson in the Gospel Hall Assemblies Women's Outreach Committee, where she reaches out to the needy, sick, and shut-in, ministering to their spiritual and material needs. Her contributions extend to her church involvement, including Bethany Gospel Hall in Sandy Point and Nazareth Gospel Hall in Fig Tree, where she conducts sewing classes for teenagers, plays the piano, directs the Church Choir, leads the Women's Meeting, and serves as a dedicated Sunday School Teacher.

Since her retirement in December 1991, Mrs. Caesar has ventured into her own business and now proudly owns Caesar's Department Store. However, her greatest satisfaction lies in seeing the slow learners she once taught, learning to read and thriving in society today.

Alexandrina Georgina Caesar's life journey is a testament to the transformative power of dedication, lifelong learning, community service, and faith. Her impact on education and her community is immeasurable, leaving an enduring legacy that continues to inspire generations to come.

He has graced stages with renowned artists such as the Mighty Sparrow, Winston Soso, and Arrow of Montserrat, showcasing his versatility and profound appreciation for music.

Born in 1960, James "Bunny" Pemberton is not just a community servant; he's a living legend in the vibrant tapestry of Sandy Point. His service journey commenced at age five, joining the Boys Brigade Troop, eventually rising to Captain at the Emmanuel Methodist Church.

Beyond the Brigade, Bunny's legacy sprawls across Track and Field athletics, marking him as the longest-serving track and field official in the Caribbean. Notably, he was the first Sandy Pointer to try out for the Caribbean Free Trade Association (CARIFTA) Games, and he later pioneered as the first Sandy Pointer to coach the Track and Field National Team from 1987 to 1992. Bunny's influence extends throughout the rural west, where he coached the Track and Field team from Challengers to Dieppe Bay. His commitment transcends athletics, co-founding the Sandy Point Junior Football team, and serving voluntarily as a firefighter from 1978 to 2004, with the St. Kitts and Nevis Firefighter Services.



A true community builder, Bunny was a founding member of the Sandy Point Red Cross in 1986. He also served in the St. Kitts and Nevis Defense Force from 1978 to 1993 and presided over the Sandy Point 4H Club from 1975 to 1978. His creativity knows no bounds, evident in writing short plays for the Boys Brigade and crafting captivating calypso songs for the Charles E. Mills Secondary School (formerly the Sandy Point High School) for 27 years. Bunny's organizational prowess shines through in founding three sports clubs—Texas Rangers, Atom Bomb, and Blueprint. As a versatile artisan, he contributed as a costume maker for Sandy Point Primary School. Notably, Bunny served as Captain for various Boys Brigade companies—Sandy Point, Old Road, Challengers, and Dieppe Bay. His multifaceted dedication is further illustrated by his role as a civil servant, including positions as a postman and social services worker until his retirement in 2021.

In essence, James "Bunny" Pemberton is not just a pillar; he's a stalwart of the Sandy Point community. His legacy reflects the values of service, knowledge-sharing, and advocacy. His unwavering commitment to the betterment of his hometown and its people rightly earns him the title of Distinguished Community Leader, deserving of the highest accolades.





NEWTON GROUND PRIMARY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S AWARD



The Mentorship Programme of the Sandy Point Benevolent Society (SPBS) is marking its 10th anniversary since its launch in October 2013. 



ONLY SO MUCH WE CAN DO

We're not going to do that on Friday."

It was a crisp and final statement delivered in her trademark British accent. She barely paused after her full stop before adding: "We're having some challenges acquiring the necessary materials."

Dianelys felt her eyes roll across her forehead, catching herself just as her mouth fixed to make a strupes. Sitting two benches away from Ms. Kaur was enough of a cushion to avoid the lecturer's keen eyes but not enough to escape her acute ears. Dianelys had been called rude by Ms. Kaur in front of the whole class once, and she was not going to take a second shame so easily. However, Dianelys was finding it hard to hide her disappointment, even while paying attention to the stern swagger of Ms. Kaur's voice.

"So, ahmm...Miss Kaur?" Julian started, "we gon' jus' miss a whole experiment jus' so?" His voice bubbled out from behind Dianelys, cutting off Ms. Kaur without her indicating he could speak. Dianelys knew what was coming next.

"Young man! Don't! Speak! When! I! Speak!" Ms. Kaur hit each phrase like Haley Matthews hitting six 6's around Kensington Oval in Barbados. Then came her distinct catchphrase delivered in a mixed British and Kittitian accent: "Yuh too bloody ruuude!" Dianelys and her classmates immediately sat up straight on their lab stools, with some turning to the wall and some placing a hand over their lips to hide their smirks. Julian walked into that one and they all felt it.

"And it's MIZ Kaur. MISTER Blackman."

"Ss...sorry Mi...miz Kaur." Julian managed to stammer. He then raised his hand, as he should have done in the first place.

"Yes," prompted Ms. Kaur.

"Mi...miz Kaur. I was wondering if we could miss out a experiment. Because CXC put it on di syllabus, and they say we have to do dem all."

"They say that every year Julian, and every year I speak to the Dean about it because," Ms. Kaur's tone softened as she leaned into her next phrase, "we can't do experiments we have neither reagents nor instruments for." Dianelys saw her lecturer make eye contact with Julian and then Ms. Kaur's gaze locked on to her own. "There's only so much we can do."

After class that Friday, Dianelys stood next to the Charles A. Halbert Public Library, waiting for a bus. She had spent the entire two hours of Chemistry Lab class sitting on a stiff metal lab stool, leaning over a cracked wooden benchtop. Now there was a thin brown line going across the middle of her white blouse under her unbuttoned royal blue waistcoat. A nasty looking stain, but better than a rip across the thigh of her royal blue trousers. It was also the result of sitting relatively still to pay attention to Ms. Kaur lecturing on the chemical synthesis of 2-acetoxybenzoic acid. Dianelys remembered how the process involved reacting acetic anhydride with 2-hydroxybenzoic acid in water using sulfuric acid as a catalyst. That reaction produced impure 2-acetoxybenzoic acid dissolved in water. The reaction mixture would then be cooled to form crystals of the impure product. Next, the crystals were washed and dried by vacuum filtration with a Büchner funnel. After that, they were dissolved in ethanol, and recrystallized in mostly pure form by a second vacuum filtration with a Büchner funnel. At that point a chemist would confirm the identity of the solid product with three methods. First, reacting it with iron III chloride. Second, determine its melting point using a melting point apparatus. And third, discern its chemical composition using a Fourier transform infrared (FTIR) spectrometer.

Dianelys' lips and teeth met to spit out a loud strupes, with the final 'S' hissing through Cunningham Street. "I jus' spend two hours out'a me good good Friday lis'ning da woman baii?" Dianelys seethed out loud. "Talk 'bout somet'ing I should'a been doin' wid me han'?"

2-acetoxybenzoic acid, aka Aspirin is one of the most widely used pain medicines in the world. Synthesizing it is relatively simple, and can be performed by college students in a basic laboratory on a Caribbean island, which is why CXC decided to put it on the syllabus for its Caribbean Advanced Proficiency Examination (CAPE) Chemistry course. Yet, Dianelys could not do it at St. Kitts and Nevis' national college.

As the bus zoomed along the Bay Road, Dianelys' memories hit her like the breeze flooding through the open windows. "How two different t'ings could mix togeder an' form somet'ing else new, Mr. Walters?" she remembered asking the teacher in the clustered space of the Washington Archibald High School Chemistry Lab.

"God works in mysterious ways, Diane" he replied with the bass in his voice thumping her chest almost like Grand Masters' full sound system.

"DEE-AN-AY-LEASE, Walters! You always callin' me name wrong!"

"M'ain' goin' up dere wid you," Mr. Walters laughed. "You got to teach me Spanish, but you got to pass me class fus." Dianelys smiled at the memory of that exchange. She had passed CSEC Chemistry with a 1 and Walters had posted a picture of her on his WhatsApp status. "Big up me long time student Dianelys!" was his caption, spelling her name right even though he always called it wrong. Dianelys remembered her mother made about 100 WhatsApp calls that same day. "Una chica inteligente! Mi Dianelys!" her mother repeated over and over. It was as if the woman wanted it to be bigger news in the Dominican Republic than it was in St. Kitts.

"Mommy, you ain tired chat me business?" Dianelys playfully mocked in her memories. The bus came to a swift stop on Pond Road across from Police Training School, jolting Dianelys back to the present. Soon she was in the heart of Newtown surrounded by jovial Kittitian insults clashing with the Spanish lyrics of bachata music. This was her family's bar on a Friday.

Dianelys paused after that sentence. She could feel her temples clenching. "Wha' ah really gone College go do Chemistry for?!" Dianelys almost shouted at herself. Mr. Walters had told her that Chemistry was not only about forming new things but also about refreshing things already used, like turning used plastic bottles into reusable shopping bags. "Is t'ings like da we need," she sighed. "How Drew t'ink we gon' come a 'sustainable island state' if we ain' gah no chemist?" Her question went unanswered like a DM left on read. "Ain' even mek sense for me to go university go do it because if dem man ain' treatin' it serious now, den when agen?"

That Monday Dianelys eased her way past the navy blue and white bodies choking CFBC's Main Office. Finally out the door, she was surprised to come face to face with Ms. Kaur.

"You dropped Chemistry?" more a statement than a question. "You're an intelligent girl, Dianelys. We need chemists like you to preserve and secure the future for the next generation."



The P.I.E. Concept: A Key to Career Success

In my 34-year career I met lots of employees (young and old around the globe) who ask me the same question, "How do I get ahead?" They don't understand why they've worked so hard, for so long, and still haven't reached the level of career success they truly desire. This is a global frustration in any type of organization or business large or small. If you are about to enter the world of work, or already in it, you may think that the most important factor for your career success is how well you perform your job. However, according to Harvey Coleman, author of "Empowering Yourself, The Organizational Game Revealed", performance is only one piece of the P.I.E. concept, which stands for Performance, Image, and Exposure. These are the three elements that determine your career advancement and satisfaction.



Your **Performance** is the quality and quantity of the work that you do and the results you deliver. It is the foundation of your career, but it only accounts for 10% of your success, according to Coleman. This means that doing your job well is necessary, but not sufficient, for getting ahead.



SICKLE CELL DISEASE (SCD)

Sickle Cell Disease, also known as SCD, is a group of inherited red blood cell disorders. Healthy red blood cells are round, and they move through small blood vessels to carry oxygen to all parts of the body. In someone who has SCD, the red blood cells become hard and sticky and look like a C-shaped farm tool called a "sickle". The sickle cells die early, which causes a constant shortage of red blood cells. Also, when they travel through small blood vessels, they get stuck and clog the blood flow. This can cause pain and other serious problems such as infection, acute chest syndrome and stroke. With proper care and treatment, those living with SCD can manage the condition and live long, healthy lives. It was thought that the sickle cell gene evolved to combat a deadly strain of malaria. Those with sickle cell traits were less likely to contract malaria.SCD, however, is still a Rare Disease affecting only 100 thousand Americans. It is especially prevalent among African descendants (1 in 365) and Hispanic Americans (1 in 1000-1400) according to the National Institutes of Health. Sickle Cell Disease treatment is very limited. It is more common in those with ancestors from these regions:

Sub-Saharan Africa, Central and South America, the Caribbean, Asia, India, and the Mediterranean. In the US, SCD affects about 1 in 16,300 Hispanic

American births and about 1 in 13 Black or African American babies is born with sickle cell trait (SCT).

Sickle cell disease affects approximately 1 in 16,300 Hispanic American births and sickle cell trait is present in 1 in 13 Black or African American babies.

Frequent pain episodes.

Pain affects your child's chest, back, legs and arms most often.

Swelling and inflammation of their joints.

Painful swelling of their hands and feet.

Sickle cell disease symptoms include:

Anemia, causing fatigue, paleness and weakness.

Jaundice (yellowing of skin and whites of eyes).

Normally, red blood cells live for about 120 days before new ones replace them. People with sickle cell conditions make a different form of hemoglobin called hemoglobin S (S stands for sickle). Red blood cells containing mostly hemoglobin S do not live as long as normal red blood cells, they only live for about 16 days.

CHILDREN AND SCD

Sickle cell conditions are inherited from parents. If a child receives two sickle cell genes - one from each parent - they may develop sickle cell disease. For instance, if one parent has Sickle Cell Anemia and the other is Normal, the children will have sickle cell trait. If both parents have Sickle Cell Trait, they have a 25% chance of having a baby with sickle cell disease.

SICKLE CELL DISEASE CAN BE FATAL

The "sickle shaped" cells are easily snagged in the smaller blood vessels in tissues and organs. This causes a blockage in the blood flow. This leads to a condition called ischemia, which is an inadequate amount of blood flow to a part of the body. This can be seen with these patients having ulcers around the ankle area. When that happens in the heart it is called myocardial ischemia, which can be fatal.

MOST COMMON PROBLEMS

The pain associated with vaso-occlusive crisis (VOC) is the most common complaint by patients. These episodes of pain are intermittent and unpredictable and often drive SCD patients to the Emergency Room. In VOC, blood flow is seriously interrupted to tissues leading to pain, and issues like acute chest syndrome, stroke, or priapism. VOC can also lead to chronic organ damage.

SIGNIFICANT IMPACT ON THE SPLEEN

The spleen is especially vulnerable to vaso-occlusive crisis (VOC). VOC can cause a condition called "asplenism" which is a reduced function of the spleen. When the spleen is not functioning normally, patients become more prone to certain types of bacterial infections. Sickle cell patients are often seen with "big stomach" due to this asplenism.

SCD AND QUALITY OF LIFE

Patients with sickle cell disease (SCD) can now live a long, quality life, with more than 95% of newborns with SCD living to adulthood. Regular checkups, following treatments, preventing infections, and practicing healthy habits like drinking plenty of water and eating nutritious food can lower the chances of complications. It's crucial to receive appropriate care from healthcare professionals and stay informed about SCD to manage the condition effectively and lead a healthy life.

PAIN MANAGEMENT INCLUDES OPIOIDS

The pain associated with Sickle Cell Disease is often treated with opioids. With the opioid crisis we want to make sure we are astute clinicians and don't overdo things. At the same time, we also don't want to undertreat. These are folks that you want to make sure are getting adequate pain management.

NEW TRÉATMENTS

There is reason to be hopeful, because as of May 2018 SCD had only two drugs, hydroxyurea (an anti-cancer agent that reduces the frequency of vaso-occlusion crisis) and L-glutamine (prevents damage to red blood cells). The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved the following agents as treatments for this disease since 2018:

- 1. Crizanlizumab that prevents VOC.
- 2. Voxelotor which reduces cell damage in SCD




As she descended the stairs, she felt the urge to say, "God is good" aloud, so much so that the neighbor downstairs responded "All the time my friend, all the time! God is always good."

INTESTINAL PARASITES




Hello to my fellow Kittians, especially those from Sandy Point. The focus this year is Internal Parasites.

Internal parasites are organisms that live inside of other living organisms. Most people think of fleas and ticks when thinking of parasites; however, the majority of parasites are internal. Most parasites can be found in sandboxes, dirt, and grass. Parasite eggs can live in your pet's feces outdoors for months. The most common parasites are Roundworms, Hookworms, Tapeworms, Giardia, Coccidia and Heartworms. Roundworms and Hookworms are the most common parasites that transmit to humans.

Roundworms are found in the small intestine, although the larvae can travel to the lungs, living and other organs. The larvae can cause damage to the nerves in the eye. In some cases, they cause diarrhea, vomiting and in extreme cases pneumonia and intestinal obstruction.

Hookworm larvae move about within the skin causing inflammation. Hookworms can penetrate into deeper tissue and cause more serious damage to the intestines. Hookworms "hook" onto the intestinal wall and feast on the pet's blood. Tapeworms are found in the small intestines. These worms grow to 6 inches or longer. Tapeworms are transmitted from pets ingesting fleas exclusively. Tapeworm segments look like sesame seeds and are usually found near pets' bedding. Giardia is another parasite found in the small intestines causing massive diarrhea. This parasite is common in shelters where large groups of animals are housed. Giardia can potentially infect humans. Giardia is transmitted through contaminated water, licking fur that has been in contact with infected feces.



Coccidia is a protozoan parasite of the small intestine. This parasite is more common in puppies and kittens. Pets become infected by swallowing dirt with contaminated feces. Clinical signs include watery diarrhea, lack of appetite, dehydration and in severe cases, can lead to death.

Heartworm disease is a serious and fatal disease in pets. These worms live in the heart lungs and blood vessels in pets causing severe lung disease and heart failure. Heartworms are transmitted by the bite of a mosquito with the heartworm larvae for heartworms. Signs of heartworm disease include persistent Cough, reluctance to exercise, easy to fatigue, decreased appetite and weight loss. Heartworms can live for 5 to 7 years in dogs and 2 to 3 years in cats. The most common signs of parasite infection in pets are diarrhea, vomiting, pot-belly look, poor haircoat, decreased appetite, wight loss, coughing, allergic reactions, anemia, nutrient loss, and toxicity. Fecal exams are a part of your early detection program. Parasite infection in humans presents digestive Problems, liver damage, lung damage, blindness, skin lesions and itchy skin. Children are more vulnerable to worm infection, due to playing on the ground with contaminated dirt. Some kids also go through stages in which they eat dirt.

How to protect yourself and your pets against worm infection?

- ⊠ Remove the pet's feces from the yard often.

- □ Check your pet's bedding frequently.
- ☐ Don't let your pets lick you on the mouth.

Good hygiene and proper disposal of feces are important in minimizing the risks of transmission of parasites to humans or other pets. Your vet can recommend treatment to eliminate and help prevent worm infections. Peace,

We were never quick to encourage the losing team to build on their skills so that they could be more competitive in the next round of games.

The fancy name for it today is bullying. Bullying: we called it "heckling." And we did this on several occasions until the heckled got what we called, "the haigs." Many times, fist fights erupted. On rare occasions someone may have gotten a bite or "chop" from a stone. No guns were part of this activity. At the end of it all, we understood we are Sandy Pointers, and we must live together as one people.

We "heckled" those from the outer villages who were bused to high school in Sandy Point. For some reason, we felt those who came from the surrounding villages to attend the high school should never outshine us in sports or education. I was always mindful of the fact that my mother was born and raised in the village of St Paul's and my father's formative years were molded in St Paul's. Hence, I was always neutral on such matters and at times came to their defense. I saw us as one people.

On reflection, "heckling" was a necessary evil. It taught us to avoid many mishaps and it also strengthened us to face an outside world that can be heartless and cruel. It emboldened us to stand firm in times of adversity. It encouraged us to stand our resolve in the face of opposition and walk away without being intimidated, hurt, or distracted from our ultimate purpose.

I recalled traveling to Basseterre on my own at the age of ten on a bus owned and operated by a notable bus driver, David Sampson, from Half Way Tree. We sped to Basseterre and as I disembarked the bus, I heard someone from Basseterre saying, "Look at all them people from Country; I wonder why they don't get their own town."

I did not withhold my tongue from that young lady. I made it clear to her that Sandy Point is a town and as bright as the people from Basseterre may be, a man from the country, Mr. Bradshaw, who was from St Paul's is running the country. Mr. Bradshaw was the Premier of St. Kitts, Nevis and Anguilla at the time. Mr. Sampson laughed hilariously and remarked, "That's the best one I have heard so far, he is a true Sandy Pointer." The lady hugged me and thought I was smart. Her embrace caused me to reflect on how hard we play as Sandy Pointers, but it built character out of us.

Despite the "heckling", Sandy Pointers shared a love that was demonstrated in the form of giving, which is in fact the true essence of love. Once, on my way from Basseterre, I was short of bus fare since I had taken some of the money to buy raisin rolls. Amory Bakery made the best ones, and I couldn't resist buying a couple after I had a tooth extraction. I always enjoyed eating - hence I was called "the fat boy for Mrs. Richardson." I decided to walk it to Sandy Point, which was a ten-mile journey because my pride got the best of me. Buses stopped to give me a ride, but I declined. Eventually, when I reached in the village of Old Road, a young man from Sandy Point stopped his truck and had me jump into the front with him. He questioned my reason for walking, and I told him what had happened. He stopped the truck and gave me the bus fare to continue to Sandy Point. He scolded me and told me that's not the way Sandy Pointers live; we are a people who care for each other. He stopped a bus owned by a gentle man we called Bullman and told him to take me home. He further told Bullman what had happened. Bullman was quite upset with me and told me I needed lashes with a cloth belt through Sandy Point. When I reached my home, he stopped and told me I owed him nothing. He further stated that our love as a community was boundless.

I have grown over the years to appreciate and recognize in my travels that all of us as Caribbean people are one, no matter where in the world we may call home. We share a common history. While the subregion has engaged in numerous treaties ostensibly to demonstrate our oneness, given the many failures (Haiti I'm sorry), we as Sandy Pointers, and Kittitians and Nevisians must see ourselves as part of a region with a rich heritage, which must be passed to our next generation with pride.



THIS IS SERVICE UNTO GOD

"We give back, so others can move forward." Catchy theme. Nice play on two familiar concepts, back and forth. It affirms the organization's mission; declares it without reservation or prevarication. It describes who its members are and speaks to a well-defined demographic group. Brilliant really. Still, the deeply contemplative soul, so like an obstinate student, poses the question, why? Why is this so important to you? Why do you gather like this every year? Why employ this particular format?

Above all else, we, whom Lloyd Best, the former ambassador of Trinidad and Tobago, call Afro Saxons, are a people of faith. Our values are firmly grounded in Judeo-Christianity. True, with a vertically pointing index finger and wry smile, some proclaim a belief in science, not faith. As if one nullifies the other. Nonetheless, we are who we are because we attended six different Sunday schools weekly. One of them may even have met on Monday afternoon. Then, in the summer, at least three Vacation Bible School sessions. Without this grounding, the Sandy Point Benevolent Society (SPBS) does not exist, its work is undone.

In one of those Sunday school classes, we all sang Isaiah 40:41: "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength..." Great beat, just the way we like it. And forty, fifty, sixty years later our souls remember it; it still moves us. We didn't consciously choose to examine the lyrics, but year after year we sang it, read it, and heard it spoken to us. And, somehow, the essence of that scripture seeped into our psyche. We learned that waiting on the Lord is not a passive thing. Helen of Troy's beauty launched a thousand ships. Micah's and Isaiah's words shift the earth beneath a million feet. Their words burrow inside, reverberating like a tight drum, taking hold, firing up passions. They just make it impossible to stand still. Transformative action naturally follows. This is why! SPBS recognizes that each generation must be the bridge that the younger generation walks across to a brighter future. SPBS understands that we are where we are because our forebears did not grow weary in doing us good. We stand today as their reward, because they did not faint. We are the tides; our motion is swaying back and forth, back and forth. This work is our service; this is how we wait on our God: We give back, so others can move forward. Simple, majestic, plain common sense, yet so profound.



IS JOURNALISM ACTIVISM?

"Journalism and activism are inextricably linked. The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines activism as "a doctrine or practice emphasizing direct vigorous action, especially in support of or opposition to one side of a controversial issue." As it pertains to journalism, activism comes in the form of what is chosen to be reported on and what facts are presented.

There is clearly a rational basis for considering journalism as activism. Objectivity should be the main priority when tackling a story, but bias creeps into the vast majority of stories, no matter what form they take. Producers are constantly making choices in their coverage that will dictate how the public will view a piece. Coverage of the George Floyd tragedy is a prime example. The subsequent portrayal and analysis of the events from different news organizations were their own forms of activism. Some outlets chose to show the violence that broke out and painted the demonstrators as dangerous rioters. Others focused on the peaceful marches and interviewed people at the scene. This coupled with staunch analysis from both sides painted a very clear picture of how editors wanted this story to be viewed. It can be argued what coverage strategy this event deserved, but they both deployed facts as their basis and were undoubtedly journalistic approaches to the story. It is activism because every choice made leads the audience "in support of or opposition to one side."

Even choosing not to cover a story is a form of activism. During the 2020 US election, journalists decided not to air some of the former president's rallies because they could not be fact-checked in real-time. Can journalists remain objective while covering a speech they refuse to air? It is an interesting question, but there is no doubt that their decision impacts the way the public will view the story. And that impact will bring them closer to forming an opinion. These ideas are most prevalent when dealing with enterprise journalism. Certain stories are consciously underrepresented and get picked up by reporters who want to shine a light on that particular issue. But what makes a reporter choose a story about an undocumented immigrant who served in the US Army? Or a story about Somali teenagers coming to terms with their culture in an American high school? In this sense, these pieces are the clearest forms of activism. They have clear agendas and ask essential questions that lead the audience to come to specific conclusions.

If the media's goal is to provide information that will help the public make enlightened decisions, then journalism must be activism. It is the media's responsibility to present the truth, but it is impossible to inform all sides of every story at the same time, all the time. Therefore, choices must be made about what is most important for people to hear - and beyond that, how the facts are presented in those stories. For these reasons and more, it is important for everyone to come at news stories with critical eyes and always look beyond the information they receive.




Soused Breadfruit

INGREDIENTS

1 Large half ripe breadfruit1/4 diced (red, green, yellow)bell peppers.

1 large onion diced.

5 large cloves garlic finely chopped.

2 tbsp fresh thyme

1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley.

1 tbsp red pepper flakes

1/4 cup vegetable oil

Juice of 2 lemons/ 3tbsp apple

cider vinegar

2 tbsp granulated sugar

1 chicken cube


1/4 cup tap water.

DIRECTIONS



However, in this piece, I am advocating for the adoption of a more nuanced definition of "born ya." It is against this backdrop, that I say with authority, confidence and pride that St Kitts is "my home sweet home."

One of the complexities inherent in being born and bred in the Caribbean is the reality of simultaneously belonging yet feeling like a nomad, simply drifting out to sea. Multiple Caribbean writers, particularly females, have discussed ad nauseum, the perpetual sensation of being shipwrecked, occupying multiple identities and spaces yet owning none. This vertigo experience defines the life of an immigrant. Herein begins my story.

My immigrant identity began to take shape long before I arrived in St. Kitts in July 1967. Born to a Kittitian mother and a St. Lucian father, my physical birthplace is Curacao. I have zero memories of my actual birth island and have only returned once. By age three, my family and I had left Curacao and relocated to St Lucia. At age eight, I boarded a ship, the Federal Maple, and sailed to St Kitts with four of my sisters and mother. Immediately upon disembarking onto foreign soil, we became a spectacle. All eyes were glued to the five sisters all adorned in green dresses and tall straw hats, speaking a French-based creole.

This aura of exoticism, that we unconsciously exuded, accompanied us to the village of St Paul's where we took up residence. Crowds of students flocked to us daily at school. They made fun of our names, our clothes and our accent. One very extraordinary teacher decided to introduce us to the entire student body by parading my sisters and me on stage. Like a band of traveling performers, we sat in a group and responded to all his questions in patois while the rest of the student body sat spellbound. However well-intentioned the exercise, he placed an even bigger bullseye on our backs. The harassment intensified until a couple of our older male cousins became our personal secret service and started escorting us around. That was until the novelty of being 'the other' wore off, and we became part of the tribe.


For the next 17 years of my life, I lived in St Kitts. Under the powerful influence of a strong-willed mother, a scholarly aunt, effective and dedicated teachers and a small Pilgrim Holiness Church, that preached spirituality and nurtured the mind, I developed a set of core values that has propelled me into an unimaginable future. The most grounded and centered I have felt as a human being occurred during those years. Spiritually, professionally, socially and politically, I had assumed my voice and became an active contributing member of all these communities.

My power to rebound from fragmentation and exile was birthed in the village of St. Paul's. The audacity to embark on a journey towards spiritual wholeness and self-awareness was awakened while sitting on some hard and uncomfortable church pews and classroom benches. My curiosity and imagination were peaked, lying on a tomb in the Anglican churchyard cemetery, when Ms. Louvina Warner, my 3rd grade teacher, took us to the graveyard to write a story entitled, "My Most Frightful Experience." She insisted that we experience an authentic setting to spin a credible tale. Traveling to other countries is a desire that was instilled in me by my now deceased aunt (Enrica Walters) who consistently supplied me with books to read each summer. These are some of the influencers who significantly shaped my belief that even a broken, wayfaring, immigrant child could believe in the promise of a secure future.

However, when the political tides turned in 1981, I was once again relegated to the status of unwanted immigrant and foreigner. This time, the disorienting and decentering of my life felt even more poignant. Being an adult and having the core of your identity devalued and invalidated is a rather traumatizing experience. Even more disempowering was the recognition that the communities by which I once defined myself, were themselves driven by fear and powerless to help me. I was not just a Kittitian; I was a St. Paulian. The latter identity bore any number of stigmas. To further complicate matters, my not being "born ya" was also used as a reason to delegitimize my rights to live and work in St. Kitts. I was being erased!

By 1984, I had migrated to the US on a quest to rediscover my shattered dreams of a promising future and find some healing along the way. Thirty-nine years later, my journey continues towards self-actualization and the positive engaging of curious young minds. Interestingly enough, a common part of the journey is wandering, meandering and drifting through waves that often leave me breathless and unanchored. It's in these moments of feeling unmoored and off course, that I see, feel and experience the beauty, breadth, depth and strength of my love for St Kitts. During these times of unknowing and wondering, the Cradle of the Caribbean rocks me gently, sometimes vigorously, to awaken me to the power that lies within me. Through a dormant memory, a forgotten face, a hardly remembered song, or an insignificant place, she conjures up an image of herself as the Mother, and I can breathe again. Clarity returns. Resiliency rules. The center holds.

It is no wonder that whenever I disembark from an airplane at Robert Llewelyn Bradshaw International Airport, my entire being exhales. My spirit feels liberated and embraces the freedom to be authentically me. My acceptance of St Kitts as home is not based on a romantic or whimsical notion, for I continue to live its complexities, contradictions and rejections. It remains a place of temperamental rhythms. St Kitts, the Motherland, is still, however, a fertile birthplace of secure and promising futures for its citizens and generations yet unborn.
