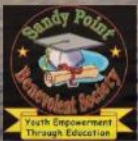

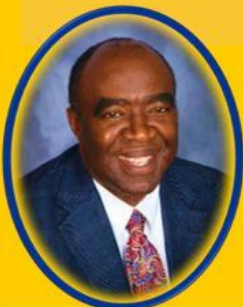


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Message From the Desk of the President

Biography of Patron

THE HONORABLE CONSTANCE V. MITCHAM, ESQ.

Lawyer, parliamentarian, Pioneer, women's rights activist, diplomat and humanitarian are the key characteristics that embody the rich academic, professional and business life of the Honorable **Constance Viola Mitcham, Esq.** Constance was born in the town of Sandy Point, St. Kitts to her parents, Mrs. Rosina Mitcham and the late Mr. Arthur Williams. She is the younger of two daughters, the older being Mrs. Pearl Sylvester.

She attended primary and secondary school in St. Kitts. Upon completing her secondary education at The Girl's High School, she journeyed to England where she enrolled in North Western College in London, and pursued her Advanced Level studies in British Constitution and Modern History for the General Certificate of Education (GCE) Examination Board. What would become Constance's life's work started when she graduated in 1971 from Kingston University College of Law, in Surrey, England, with an LL.B. (Honor's) degree. In 1972, Miss. Mitcham completed her pupillage at the Inns of Court, Middle Temple, in London, England, and obtained the Barrister-at-Law Certificate. Having accomplished this, she was called to the Bar of England and Wales, a dream come true. At that juncture in her life, her career in law was then poised for take off.

In 1974, Miss Mitcham returned to the Caribbean and was called to the Bar of several Caribbean jurisdictions including St. Kitts, Nevis and Anguilla, the British Virgin Islands (BVI) and Antigua. She served as High Court Registrar and Chief Magistrate of the BVI. during the period 1974 to 1977. In 1980 she served in her native St. Kitts-Nevis as a senior magistrate. Throughout her legal career, Miss. Mitcham represented several high profile clients in civil proceedings and Commissions of Inquiry. Her clients included the first and former Prime Minister of the Federation of St. Kitts and Nevis, the Rt. Hon. Dr. Sir Kennedy A. Simmonds, and other Leaders of the People's Action Movement (PAM). It was the quality of such representations that brought international acclaim for the brilliance of this legal mind.

Miss. Mitcham's legal education and training and her respect for the rule of law made her a much sought after legal luminary in the national, regional and international arenas. Her legal and professional accomplishments earned her employment, membership of and participation in several public and social organizations and institutions. On the national front, her vast leadership experience provided her with the competence to serve as Vice President and President of the St. Kitts Nevis Bar Association. Miss. Mitcham also rendered her services as Chair of the Cable Television Company, Chair of the St. Kitts and Nevis Social Security Board, and Chair of the Development Bank of St. Kitts



and Nevis. On the regional scene, the British Virgin Islands government recognized the caliber of this British trained lawyer and appointed her as Supervisor of the 1975 General Elections held in that British Territory.

The name Constance Viola Mitcham will be forever etched in the annals of our nation's history as a pioneer as it pertains to women in law, women in politics and women's rights in St. Kitts and Nevis. Her work as a woman in law, in politics and as an advocate for women's rights did not only impact the women of our Federation, but women across the Caribbean and the world as well. Miss. Mitcham served as President of the Caribbean Institute for Democratic Women. In 1975 Ms. Mitcham was appointed Country Vice President of the International Federation of Female Lawyers. Additionally, she carried the office of Vice President of the Inter American Commission of Women at the Organization of American States in Washington, DC.

It is the view of many, especially the women folk of our Federation, that Constance Mitcham's greatest contribution to the national development of our country lies in her three consecutive terms as a Federal Minister of Health, Women's Affairs and Labor, in the People's Action Movement (PAM) Administration. In 1984 history was created when the Honorable Constance became the first woman to be elected to the Federal Parliament of St. Christopher and Nevis. During the fifteen year rule of the People's Action Movement, Miss. Mitcham was appointed by the Governor General to act in several other posts including that of Acting Prime Minister of St. Kitts and Nevis in May of 1995. She remained an elected representative for the Electoral District of St. Christopher 4 until 1995, when she retired from active politics undefeated and returned to private legal practice in St. Kitts, Nevis, Anguilla, the British Virgin Islands, and Antigua.

Today, Miss. Mitcham is still very active in the legal fraternity in her homeland of St. Kitts Nevis and beyond. She is well known and recognized as Founder and Head of the reputable Caribbean Legal firm of Mitcham & Benjamin with Chambers, in Basseterre, St. Kitts. Following the 2015 change of government in the Federation, Miss. Mitcham was appointed Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary and a special Adviser to the Prime Minister of the Unity Government of St. Kitts and Nevis. The Sandy Point Benevolent Society is pleased to salute Her Excellency, Constance V. Mitcham on her recent appointment and thank her for the many years of yeoman's service to our beloved country.

Biography of Guest Speaker

Mr. Lerone Joseph, B.S., M.Sc.

A distinguished son of the soil, a proud Sandy Pointer, the third son of Hillary Joseph and Pamela Broadbelt-Joseph of Sandy Point, St. Kitts. **Mr. Lerone Joseph** acquired his formative education at the Sandy Point Primary School where he graduated top of his class becoming the 2000 SPBS Principal's Award Winner. He graduated from the Sandy Point High School in 2005 with nine CXC subjects, and attended the Clarence Fitzroy Bryant College for one year.

From his elementary school years, Lerone has built a brilliant educational record. In 2011 he graduated with honors from the University at Albany in New York and was awarded a Bachelor's of Arts degree. As an undergraduate he doubled majored in Sociology and Criminology, and minored in Mathematics with a concentration in Statistical Analysis. The fall of 2011 saw Lerone continuing his academic and professional career at one of the nation's leading research schools in Criminal Justice and Forensic Science at the University of New Haven. There he pursued a Master's of Science degree in Criminal Justice with a concentration in Justice Management and Administration. In addition to being awarded his M.Sc. in January 2013, Lerone earned a graduate certificate in Public Administration. One of his academic goals is to complete a PhD in Criminology and become a university professor.

Coupled with Lerone's exceptional performance in the classroom, he completed several internships that provided him with the required work experience for his future professional career. Most notable were his 2010 fall internship with Albany County Crime Victims and Sexual Violence Center, and the 2011 spring attachment to the Albany County Department of Probation as Victim Advocate. His internship experience also took him to the University at Albany Student Group Affairs as a Compliance Officer.

Lerone's work experience and career path are as equally impressive as his academic accomplishments. At the University at Albany he worked as a Resident Assistant, Orientation Assistant, and Housing Manager. While at New Ha-



ven University, Lerone worked as a Resident Director for the Department of Residential Life from 2011 to 2013. In 2013 Winston Salem State University in North Carolina became the beneficiary of his expertise when he served as one of its Hall Directors for two years.

In June of this year Lerone accepted a position with Auburn University in Alabama as one of its Area Directors for University Housing and Residence Life.

Mr. Joseph's scholarship, his intellectual acumen and impeccable quality of his work have not gone unnoticed. As an undergrad, the University at Albany, in March 2011, honored him with its *Presidential Award for Leadership*. This award gives recognition to undergraduate students who have made significant contributions to enhance the quality of life at UA in the area of extraordinary leadership, service, academic achievement, and involvement in the university community.

Winston Salem State University recognized his work with the *Hall Director of the Year Award and the Ordinary Men Award for 2014*. Lerone's scholarly work also earned him recognition when he was adjudged the *NEACUHO 2012 Case Study Winner*. These accomplishments speak volumes of the caliber of this young, humble Sandy Pointer.

Amidst his busy schedule, and true to his nature, Lerone finds time to give back to the Winston Salem community by volunteering with the Cooperate Reads Program and the Big Brother & Big Sister Mentorship Program. The Sandy Point Benevolent Society, Inc. is proud to salute Mr. Lerone Joseph, its 2000 Principal's Award Winner!

SALUTING SBPS ALUMNUS — HON. SHAWN K. RICHARDS,

DEPUTY PRIME MINISTER

The Buchanan family, the alumni of the Sandy Point High School, and the community of Sandy Point, are quite proud to have a son of the rich Sandy Point soil as our Federation's Deputy Prime Minister. Shawn Kenneth Richards was born on 8th December 1972 to Kenneth and Marilyn Richards of Downing Street, Sandy Point.



He was educated at the Sandy Point Primary and Sandy Point High Schools. In 1989 when he graduated

from high school, Shawn was an outstanding student. In 1990, he travelled to St. Thomas with his parents and there, at the University of the Virgin Islands (UVI), he pursued a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration. Shawn returned to his beloved country and worked for a short while. It is worthy of note that when there was need for a teacher of Business at his High School, Shawn voluntarily taught the areas at the school and faithfully reported to the classes. Subsequently, he travelled to Cleveland, Ohio to pursue further studies. Shortly after, he graduated with a Master's degree from Cleveland State University.

After working for a short time in St. Thomas USVI, Shawn again returned home to make a contribution to the land of his birth as auditor to the Government of St. Kitts and Nevis and later served as Internal Auditor for the St. Kitts Nevis Trading Development Corporation (TDC).

Shawn has always been actively involved in the service and development of people. This is evident in his assistance for many years of the Sandy Point High School's debating team. Over the years, he enjoyed mentoring many students who sat the Caribbean Examinations, devoting much of his time to assisting with the editing and guidance of students while they completed their SBAs towards final exams. His home has the venue for many compilation and printing of quite a many SBAs.

Shawn's was an athlete for Orange House during his years at high school. He has, from the commencement of his working sojourn in St. Kitts and Nevis ardently sponsored many sporting competitions and has been fortunate to serve on many sports committee in his home town of Sandy Point. Even after his entire family decided to migrate to the United States Virgin Islands, Shawn decided to stay in St. Kitts and Nevis to make what he felt was an important contribution to his community and country. Within his community, Shawn was meaningfully involved in different ways. At his church, Shawn was involved in the Sandy Point Methodist Church Youth Fellow-

ship, where he served a short but impactful stint as President of that group.

Equal to his personal life, is Shawn's dedication to his political life, the nucleus of which is the real and tangible advancement of the life for the people of his electoral constituency of St. Christopher # 5, Sandy Point and Fig Tree. Shawn moved from a young Pamite to Political candidate. In his early thirties, Shawn entered active politics to take on the



then Constituency Representative, Mrs. Jacinth Henry Martin. He was victorious in the 2004 General Elections and thereafter his momentum continued to grow. It was no surprise that Shawn soon advanced to the post of Deputy Leader of the People's Action Movement Party around 2002.

In 2009 when the matter of dual citizenship was raised leading up to the next General Election, Shawn, against the advice of many, renounced his United States Citizenship in order to contest the 2010 General Elections. Such an act was seen by many as a very selfless and profoundly meaningful show of love of country. For this, love for Shawn continued to grow. It was no doubt that he was again successful in the 2010 General Elections. Since then, he has advanced further up the political ladder of success to become the political leader of the P.A.M in 2012, and now the nation's Deputy Prime Minister.

The growing popularity of Shawn as a young dynamic leader continues to catch the eyes of many citizens. He has been greatly admired for his astute leadership and the manner in which he is able to confront his political opponents with the most progressive democratic thoughts as it pertains to the country. This distinguished gentleman is fearless and he has the force of personality to extract a deep measure of respect, even from his foremost critics in politics.

Shawn is the first past student of the Sandy Point High School to rise to the post of Deputy Prime Minister in our nation. It is for us, the Buchanan family, a proud and distinct honour to congratulate a leader in our family for his ascension to one of the highest positions in government. ALRICK VINCENT WARNER

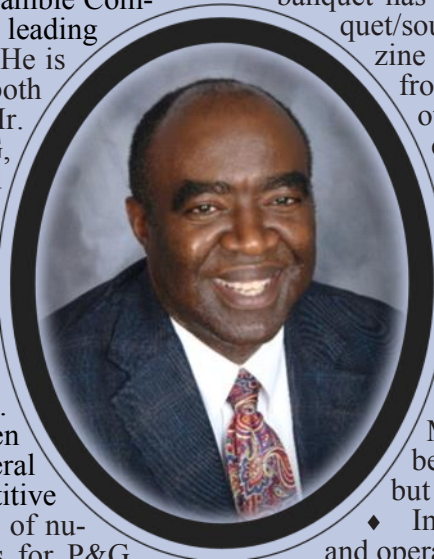

Mr. Warner has served SPBS in many leadership capacities. He served two terms as Chairman of the Board and two terms as Vice President from 2010 to 2012. During his tenure as Vice President SPBS initiated and successfully executed two of its signature fundraising events – the inaugural Awards Banquet in September 2011 and its inaugural Easter Breakfast in April of 2012. Mr. Warner played a dynamic role in ensuring the success of these events even after his departure from the post of Vice President.



Mr. Warner's signature contribution to the annual awards banquet has been in the form of the production of the banquet/souvenir magazine. The production of this magazine has brought numerous compliments to SPBS from far and wide. The amount of the time and other resources that Mr. Warner has expended on creating and producing this masterpiece of a magazine should not go unnoticed. Assistant Commissioner of Police (ACP), **Ian M.**



Queeley is a serving member of the Royal St. Kitts-Nevis Police Force (RSKNPF). He has been a member of that noble Law Enforcement Institution for the past thirty (30) years. Fifteen (15) of which have been at the Strategic management and Executive levels.

Upon successful completion of his initial police training, he worked at several departments and stations doing general policing, but it was while posted at the Drug Squad (where he spent approximately thirteen (13) years) that he truly distinguished himself. During this time he was seconded to the Central Liaison Office of the Regional Security System (RSS) in Barbados for a period of three (3) years as a Permanent Instructor. In that role, he had special responsibilities for Physical Training, Weapon Training and Internal Security.

Upon his return to his Parent Force (RSKNPF), he was posted at the Police Training School for a number of years and worked his way up to the position of Chief Instructor. In January 2000 he was promoted to Inspector, completed the on-going Recruit Training Course then was transferred to the Frigate Bay Police Station, as the Officer Commanding. After 4 years, he was again promoted to Superintendent and went on to assume other Senior Management and Command Positions (to include the Force Personnel Officer, Divisional Commander for St. Christopher Divisions A and B and later ACP - Operations). In 2008, he was again seconded to Regional Security System (RSS) for another stint lasting almost three (3) years, in the capacity of Director of Plans, Intelligence and Law Enforcement.

During his career, he has had the benefit of several Training Courses in varying aspects of policing with particular emphasis on Drug Interdiction/Investigations, Financial Investigations, Criminal Investigations, Intelligence, Management and Leadership; to name a few. He is a qualified Regional Instructor and Firing Range Officer and the Senior Explosives (Bomb) Technician within the RSKNPF.

He is also a graduate with distinction of three (3) of the

world's most prestigious Law Enforcement Institutions. In 2000, he successfully completed the Senior Police Administration Course at the Royal Canadian Mounted Police College, in Canada. In 2004, he successfully completed the International Commanders' Program at the Bramshill Police Staff College (now renamed the College of Policing) in England. Two (2) years later, he successfully completed a course of study at the FBI National Academy in the United States. Additionally, he is also a graduate of the National Defense University in Washington, where he studied Caribbean Defense and Security at the Centre for Hemispheric Defense Studies (CHDS).

ACP Queeley is a member of several International Organizations, such as the Federal Bureau of Investigations National Academy Associates (FBINAA), the International Association of Bomb Technician and Investigators (IABTI), the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives (NOBLE) and the International Association of Chiefs' of Police (IACP). He is also an Alumni of the Centre for Hemispheric Defense Studies (CHDS) in Washington DC, the College of Policing (COP) in England, the United Nations Asian and Far East Institute (UNAFEI) in Japan and the Singapore Aviation Authority.

To compliment his Police related training and professional qualifications ACP Queeley's academic qualifications include, a Post Graduate Diploma in Criminal Justice and Police Management from the University of Leicester, a Post Graduate Certificate in Criminal Justice from the University of Virginia, a Post Graduate Diploma in Security Administration, from the UWI, (St. Augustine, Trinidad) and Masters' in Business Administration – *with Distinction*, from the UWI, Cave Hill, Barbados.

In relation to his involvement in the wider community, ACP Queeley has represented the Police Force in Cricket, Football and Dominoes. He also served for many years on the management of the Police Cooperative Credit Union as a member of the Board of Directors and later as the President. He was also the Director of Security for the St. Kitts Music Festival for over ten (10) years and the Police Force's representative on the National Carnival Committee and other Major Events to include but not limited to Cricket World Cup (CWC) 2007.

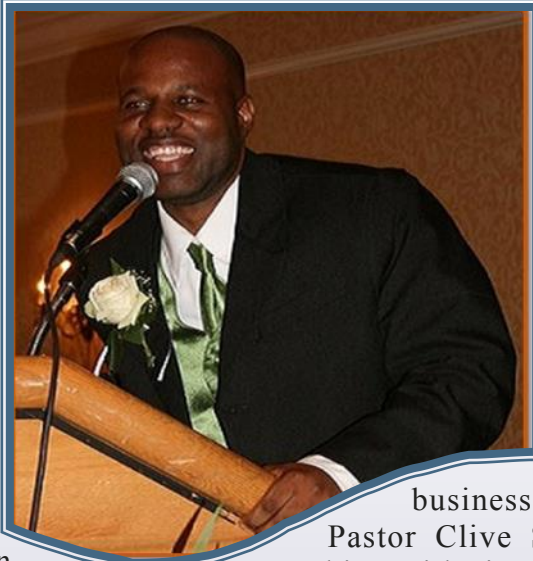
PASTOR CLIVE CLEMENT SAUNDERS

Under his dynamic leadership, Unique Touch Christian Centre has grown exponentially since its inception and had become one of the fastest growing churches in St. Kitts. Unique Touch Christian Centre is a 12-year old congregation with over 120 members and 13 active ministries.

The young powerful Pastor, Preacher, Teacher and leader is able to build bridges and reach across generations, gender, race, culture and ethnicity that changes, rebuilds and restores lives. Parents and youth in search of the partnerships instead of persecution, guidance instead of guilt, and opportunity instead of opposition often join after just one visit. Save Our Sons is a residential treatment home for troubled boys. Pastor Saunders believes that love and discipline in a controlled environment is the key to changing destructive behavior. SOS provides care for young men who currently need a change in environment. SOS is responsible for the basic necessities of food, shelter and clothing for those young men as well as responsibility of molding the character of each of our residents. Pastor Saunders states that "No boy will ever be denied because of his family's financial circumstances."

He is the Director of Boys Of Standard the only male gospel singing group in the Town of Sandy Point. Pastor Saunders is also the Group Scout Leader for the Sandy Point Scout group, Newton Ground Scout Group, and Verchilds High School Scout Group. He



also works as a Guidance Counselor at the Verchilds High School for the past ten years. He is a popular Radio Host on Dominion Radio 91.5 FM on Saturdays from 11:00 am to 12:30 pm. The name of his radio program is Youth Rap. Many lives are touched by the life changing, inspirational, uplifting, saving and spirit filled message of the gospel.

Pastor Clive Saunders also founded the Splash Down Barbershop, where he encourage and train young men to use their skills to operate their own business.

BRIMSTONE HILL FORTRESS NATIONAL PARK SOCIETY

The Society for the Restoration of Brimstone Hill was founded by volunteers on 10 April 1965. In 1987 Brimstone Hill Fortress was designated a National Monument under the National Conservation and Environmental Protection Act (NCEPA) and the Society's name was changed to the Brimstone Hill Fortress National Park Society (BHFNPS). The Society's board, known as the Council of Management, is made up of unpaid volunteers who have distinguished themselves in local society. The current President of the Council is Sir Probyn Inniss, a former Governor of St. Kitts and Nevis. Day to day operations of the Society are the responsibility of a small, extremely hardworking and loyal paid staff. The General Manager is the Chief Executive Officer and also holds a non-voting seat on Council. The BHFNPS has the distinction of being one of the few NGOs in the world given a legal mandate to manage a National Park and set all necessary regulations.

In 1999 Brimstone Hill Fortress National Park was designated a World Heritage Site of "Outstanding Universal Value" by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO). Brimstone Hill Fortress was the first cultural heritage (man-made) site in the Eastern Caribbean

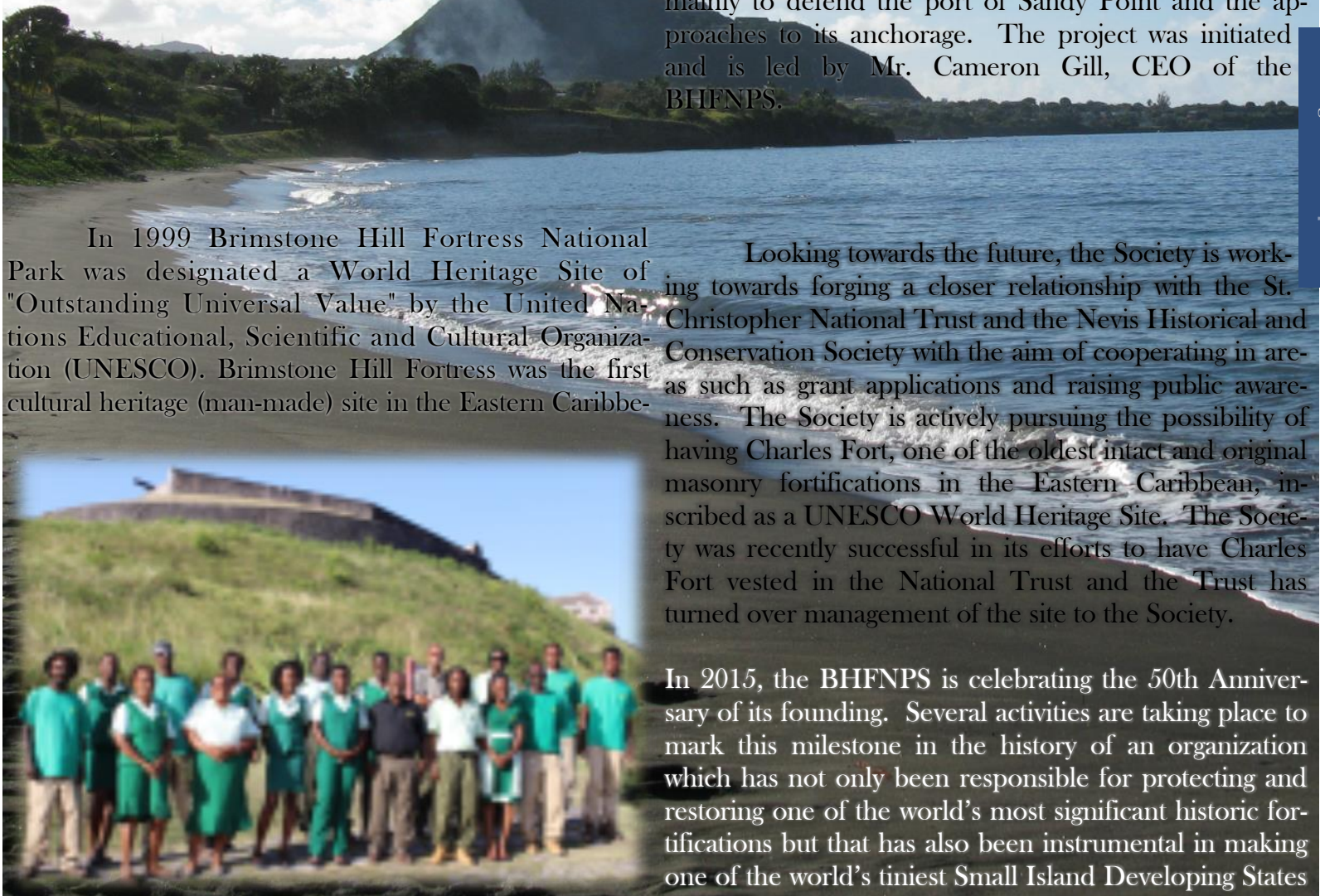
an to be inscribed on UNESCO's World Heritage List.

The BHFNPS, also known as the Society, undertakes several outreach activities with the aim of raising awareness of our country's rich heritage. These include the History & Heritage Month of Activities, which is conducted in collaboration with several governmental and non-governmental partners; the Easter Cannonball Hunt; the Emancipation Festival and the Independence Anniversary Brimstone Hill Run for the Fit and Fearless.

The Society, in partnership with Leiden University in the Netherlands and the Foundation for Maritime Archaeology in Curacao (STIMACUR), has since 2012 been engaged in a long term historical and archaeological research project on the historic port of Sandy Point and its anchorage. The Brimstone Hill Fortress and its sister fort, Charles Fort (along with several other fortifications), were constructed from the 17th century onwards mainly to defend the port of Sandy Point and the approaches to its anchorage. The project was initiated and is led by Mr. Cameron Gill, CEO of the BHFNPS.

Looking towards the future, the Society is working towards forging a closer relationship with the St. Christopher National Trust and the Nevis Historical and Conservation Society with the aim of cooperating in areas such as grant applications and raising public awareness. The Society is actively pursuing the possibility of having Charles Fort, one of the oldest intact and original masonry fortifications in the Eastern Caribbean, inscribed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. The Society was recently successful in its efforts to have Charles Fort vested in the National Trust and the Trust has turned over management of the site to the Society.

In 2015, the BHFNPS is celebrating the 50th Anniversary of its founding. Several activities are taking place to mark this milestone in the history of an organization which has not only been responsible for protecting and restoring one of the world's most significant historic fortifications but that has also been instrumental in making one of the world's tiniest Small Island Developing States

gles of living in an underserved community. Despite the limitations I always strove to overlook my circumstance and pressed on with my future in mind. Due to financial difficulties I was unable to experience day-care or pre-schooling days. When it was time to begin my formal education at the St Paul's Primary School, I actually enrolled a few months later than my peers due to the unavailability of school uniform and supplies. This set back, however did not hinder me from being successful in academics and track and field.

In 1998 I graduated from my premier learning institution and entered the Sandy Point High School (SPHS) now the Charles E. Mills Secondary School (CEMSS). There my reign continued in athletics while my academic performance suffered. My tenure at SPHS saw me placing first each year in the Cross Country run and setting records in both the 800 meter and 1500 meter events. I was a proud Green Houser. And this declaration was really tested when one of the recipients of the Principal's Award, **Ms. Devatrea Annique Mike**, graduated high school with outstanding results but for financial reasons, was unable to attend the local community college, Clarence Fitzroy Bryant College. In following up on her Devatrea's academic progress, it became clear that she was not enrolled to attend the CFB College.

At this point, SPBS was faced with a test of its mettle. Devatrea graduated from high school with 11 CXC CSEC passes with grade 1s in English A, French, Principles of Business, Human & Social Biology, Grade 2s in Biology, Physics, Spanish and Caribbean History, and Grade 3s in Mathematics, Principles of Accounts and Chemistry. Not only did she accomplish such an outstanding performance, on Speech Day she also received 'The Patricia Isles- Caesar Award for the best results in English'.

Ms. Mike's high school successes were anticipated as she was an outstanding student throughout her five year stint. Each year at the secondary level, Ms. Mike was on the Honour Roll and the Principal's list and was awarded as one of the top two students of each form level.



And in addition to her commitment to academic successes, while at high school, Devatrea participated in the drama and poetry club, was a member of the Prefect Association, and played netball well enough to be selected as a member of the St. Kitts Under 13 Netball Team.

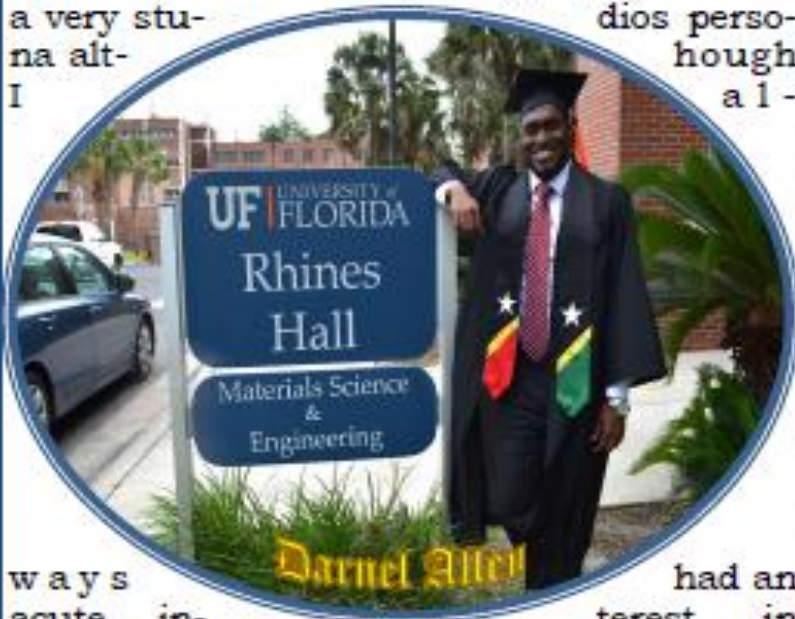

COLORECTAL CANCER

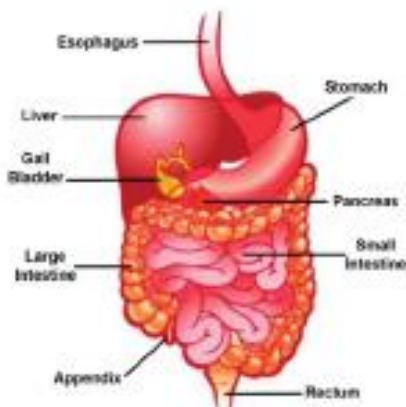
Colorectal cancer is a term for cancer that starts in either the colon or the rectum. Colon cancer and rectal cancer have many features in common.



This article will review the GI tract, risk factors, screening and preventative measures. Treatment modalities are beyond the scope of this article and will not be discussed.

The Gastro-Intestinal Tract

After food is chewed and swallowed, it travels to the stomach. There it is partly broken down and sent to the small intestine. The small intestine is only called small because it isn't very wide compared to the colon. In fact, the small intestine is the longest part of the digestive system -- about 20 feet. The small intestine also breaks down the food and absorbs most of the nutrients.



What remains goes into the colon (large intestine), a muscular tube about 5 feet long. The colon absorbs water and nutrients from the food and also serves as a storage place for waste matter (feces). Feces moves from the colon into the rectum, which is the last 6 inches of the digestive system. From

there, stool passes out of the body through the opening called the anus.

The colon begins at the end of the small intestine – on the right side of the body at a place called the cecum. It goes up (the ascending colon in the picture) and bends to go across the top of the belly (the transverse colon in the picture), and turns down again on the left side (the descending colon in the picture). The rectum is in the lower part of the pelvis.

Most colorectal cancers start as a **polyp** – a growth that starts in the inner lining of the colon or rectum and grows toward the center. Most polyps are not cancer. Only certain types of polyps (called adenomas) can become cancer. Taking out a polyp early, when it is small, may keep it from becoming cancer.

Over 95% of colon and rectal cancers are **adenocarcinomas**. These are cancers that start in gland

cells, like the cells that line the inside of the colon and rectum. There are some other, more rare, types of tumors of the colon and rectum.

Statistics about Colorectal Cancer

The American Cancer Society's estimates for colorectal cancer in the United States for 2015 are:

- About 93,090 new cases of colon cancer
- About 39,610 new cases of rectal cancer
- About 49,700 deaths from colorectal cancer

Not counting skin cancers, colorectal cancer is the **third most common cancer found in men and women** in this country. Overall, the lifetime risk of developing colorectal cancer is about 1 in 20.

The death rate from colorectal cancer has been going down for more than 20 years.

What are the risk factors for Colorectal Cancer?

While we do not know the exact cause of most colorectal cancers, there are certain known risk factors. A risk factor is something that affects a person's chance of getting a disease. Some risk factors, like smoking, can be controlled. Others, such as a person's age, can't be changed. But risk factors don't tell us everything. Having a risk factor, or even several, does not mean that you will get the disease. And some people who get colorectal cancer may not have any known risk factors. Even if a person with colorectal cancer has a risk factor, it is often very hard to know what part that risk factor may have played in the development of the disease.

Researchers have found some risk factors that may increase a person's chance of getting polyps or colorectal cancer.

Risk factors one cannot change

- ✓ Age: your risk gets higher as you get older
- ✓ Having had colorectal cancer or certain kinds of polyps before
- ✓ Having a history of **ulcerative colitis** or **Crohn's disease**
- ✓ Family history of colorectal cancer
- ✓ Race or ethnic background, such as being **African American** or **Ashkenazi Jews**
- ✓ Type 2 diabetes
- ✓ Certain family syndromes, like **familial adenomatous polyposis (FAP)** or **hereditary non-polyposis colon cancer (HNPCC, also called Lynch syndrome)**

Risk factors linked to habits

- ❖ Certain types of diets: one that is high in **red meats** (beef, lamb, or liver) and **processed meats** (like hot dogs, bologna, and lunch meat) can increase your colorectal cancer risk.
- ❖ Cooking meats at very high heat (frying, broiling, or grilling) can create chemicals that might increase cancer risk.
- ❖ **Lack of exercise**
- ❖ Being very **overweight** (or obese)
- ❖ **Smoking**
- ❖ **Heavy alcohol use**

Signs and Symptoms of Colon Cancer

Early colorectal cancers may not cause any symptoms. This is why screening is recommended.

Colorectal cancer may cause one or more of these symptoms:

- ⬇ A change in bowel habits, such as diarrhea, constipation, or narrowing of the stool, that lasts for more than a few days
- ⬇ A feeling that you need to have a bowel movement that is not relieved by doing so
- ⬇ Rectal bleeding
- ⬇ Blood in the stool, which may cause the stool to look dark
- ⬇ Cramping or abdominal (belly) pain
- ⬇ Weakness and fatigue
- ⬇ Unintended weight loss

Colorectal cancers can bleed. While sometimes the blood can be seen in the stool or make it look darker, often the stool looks normal. Sometimes the first sign of colorectal cancer is a blood test showing a low red blood cell count (anemia).

Most of these problems are more often caused by conditions other than colorectal cancer, such as infection, hemorrhoids, irritable bowel syndrome, or inflammatory bowel disease. Still, if you have any of these problems, it's important to see your doctor right away so the cause can be found and treated, if needed.

Can Colorectal Cancer be prevented?

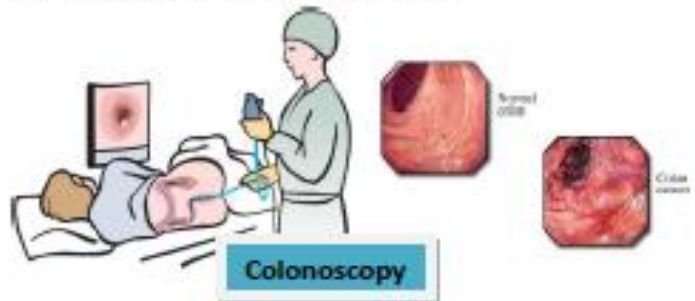
We don't know the exact cause of most colorectal cancers. However, it is possible to prevent many of them.

Screening

Regular colorectal cancer screening is one of the most powerful weapons for preventing colorectal cancer. Screening is the process of looking for cancer or pre-cancer in people who have no symptoms of the disease. From the time the first abnormal cells start to grow into polyps, it usually takes about 10 to 15 years for them to

develop into colorectal cancer. Regular screening can, in many cases, prevent colorectal cancer altogether. This is because most polyps can be found and removed before they turn into cancer. Screening can also find colorectal cancer early, when it is highly curable. People who have no identified risk factors (other than age) **should begin regular screening at age 50**. Those who have a family history or other risk factors for colorectal polyps or cancer, such as inflammatory bowel disease, should talk with their doctor about starting screening at a younger age, about getting screened more frequently, and about which tests are best for them.



Colonoscopy: a Doctor -Surgeon or gastroenterologist- performs a colonoscopy. During a colonoscopy, a long, flexible tube (colonoscope) is inserted into the rectum. A tiny video camera at the tip of the tube allows the doctor to view the inside of the entire colon. If necessary, polyps or other types of abnormal tissue can be removed through the scope during a colonoscopy. Tissue samples (biopsies) can be taken during a colonoscopy as well.

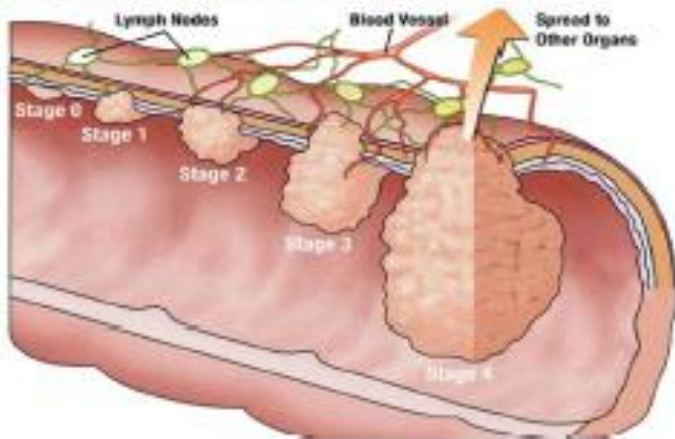

As the stages go higher it decreases the chance of cure.
Stage 0 has the best chance of cure

• **In situ (Stage 0):** Cancers that have not yet begun to invade the wall of the colon or rectum; these preinvasive lesions are not included in the cancer statistics provided in this report.

• **Local (Stages 1 & 2):** Cancers that have grown into the wall of the colon or rectum, but have not extended through the wall to invade nearby tissues

• **Regional (Stage 3):** Cancers that have spread through the wall of the colon or rectum and have invaded nearby tissue, or that have spread to nearby lymph nodes

• **Distant (Stage 4):** Cancers that have spread to other parts of the body, such as the liver or lung

Diet, Exercise and Body weight

Other things that can help lower your risk are eating a **healthy diet**, **getting exercise**, and maintaining a **healthy weight**.

Reduce your risk of colorectal cancer.

1. Get screened regularly.
2. Maintain a healthy weight throughout life.
3. Adopt a physically active lifestyle.
4. Consume a healthy diet with an emphasis on plant sources; specifically:
 - a. Choose foods and beverages in amounts that help achieve and maintain a healthy weight.
 - b. Limit consumption of red and processed meat.
 - c. Eat at least 2½ cups of vegetables and fruits each day.
 - d. Choose whole grains instead of refined grain products.
5. If you drink alcoholic beverages, limit consumption.
6. Consume the recommended levels of calcium, & Vitamin D primarily through food sources

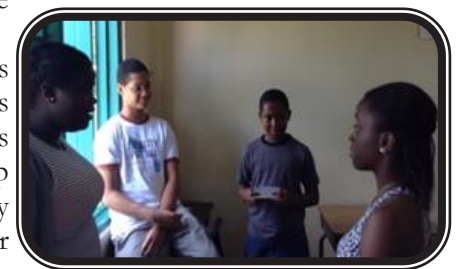

There was general appreciation for this exposure which would serve to bolster their communication skills.

The Motivational Study Skills Seminar was held in Term 3 to better help the mentees in their preparation for the end of year examinations. During that session there was quite a lot of interaction, sharing, learning and encouragement. In his brief Motivational presentation, Denver Mike focused on the relevance of studying. He, with his usual charisma and conviction, outlined how beneficial studying is in the short, medium and long term. He outlined how as a poor student he was afforded innumerable opportunities locally and regionally, during high school and beyond, because he studied hard and did well. In closing, Denver left the mentees with some simple and effective tips for studying and Arnold Glasgow's definition of success- "Success is simple. Success is simple. Do what's right, the right way, at the right time." The mentees were very receptive and appreciative, and they stayed on interacting and seeking guidance even after the Motivational Study Skills Seminar ended. Subsequently some small group, subject specific sessions were organized for different mentees based on the needs they shared.

During the year, data was gathered from the Mentees about their experiences within the Mentorship programme and how they perceive they can be better supported. The feedback generally was that they would prefer more opportunities for face to face interactions with mentors and more social activities. There are a number of possible activities being planned for the 2015- 2016 academic year. The hope is that the mentorship

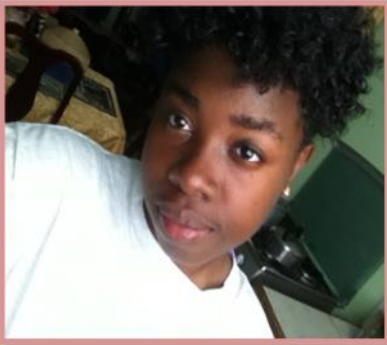


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The 2010 SPBS Principal Awards Recipient Shines

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SANDY POINT APPOINTED COMMISSIONER
ULESTER DOUGLAS

On Monday, July 27, **Ulester Douglas** of Sandy Point was sworn in as a Commissioner in Atlanta, Georgia by Governor Nathan Deal. The Governor appointed Mr. Douglas to the Georgia Commission on Family Violence due to his outstanding 20 years championing the cause to end domestic violence against women and girls. This appointment was the latest in an impressive assembly of awards and honors in recognition of his extraordinary leadership and service.

Ulester is the Executive Director of Men Stopping Violence (MSV), a nationally acclaimed organization dedicated to ending male violence against women. He is also a licensed psychotherapist, and has just finished his third year as an adjunct professor at Emory University in Atlanta. He has authored and co-authored curriculum, books chapters and peer reviewed articles on family violence and has been interviewed by national media including The New York Times, CNN, and The Tom Joyner Morning show.

Ulester is frequently called upon for commentary and advice when there is a high-profile case of domestic violence, as we saw on CNN last year during the events involving NFL foot-



ball player, Ray Rice. Also, he provides training, keynotes and consultation in this field nationally, as well as internationally. His most rewarding engagement was an assignment by the U.S. State Department to provide consultation and training in St. Kitts, Nevis and Barbados; his most exciting was an invitation to the White House in 2010, to join the President and Vice President for the launch of the administration's domestic violence initiatives.

Ulester attended Sandy Point High School (now known as Charles E. Mills High School), and earned his undergraduate and graduate degrees from The University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. He is the son of Elaine Douglas and Joseph Harris, Sr. of Sandy Point.

Also present at the swearing-in ceremony, were his sister, Lindley Cole (Teacher Lindy), her husband, Maurice Cole and a family friend, Christopher Cadlaon. Our congratulations to Commissioner Ulester Douglas. You make us proud.

PET CORNER – THE SENIOR PET

Hello to all my fellow Caribbean folks, especially those from Sandy Point, St. Kitts.

This episode of Pet Corner will focus on the senior pet.



Just as people are living longer than they did in the past, many pets are living longer too. Most pets begin to experience age-related diseases between the age of 7 and 12 years of age. Although aging is a natural process, many illnesses accompany advancing years.

The health of your pet can change rapidly as he/she ages and many of these changes can go unnoticed. The more common senior disease I will discuss are dental, liver, kidney, heart and lungs, joint, endocrine (hormone), cancer, ocular (eye) and the gastrointestinal systems.

Dental diseases are exceptionally common. About 85% of pets over 6 years of age have periodontal disease, gingivitis and/or oral cancer. Typical signs to look for are bad breath, redness of the gums, swollen gums and oral masses or growths. These conditions, if left untreated, can lead to heart disease, tooth loss, kidney and liver disease, or cancer.

Liver disease is more common in older dogs and less common in cats. Conditions included would be inflammatory, degenerative and cancerous liver disease. The most common signs are decreased appetite, weight loss, vomiting, diarrhea, increased thirst or urination. Liver abnormalities can progress to anemia, a bleeding disorder, or liver failure.

Kidney disease affects about 10% of dogs over the age of 12 and 1% of pets of all ages. Kidney failure, kidney stones, kidney infection, kidney insufficiency are a few of the conditions that affect senior pets. Clinical signs to look for are increased thirst and urination, decreased appetite, weight loss, vomiting, diarrhea and back pain. If left untreated, kidney disease would progress to kidney failure, heart disease and even death.

Problems in the **heart and lungs** affect about 6% of all pets. Examples include cardiac (heart) disease, pneumonia, bronchitis and emphysema. The clinical signs to look for are decreased stamina, coughing, difficulty breathing, weight loss and a distended abdomen (belly). If left untreated, heart disease can progress to kidney and liver disease and eventually lead to death.

Joint disease can affect about 20% of dogs and 10% of cats. Common examples include arthritis, back disease, hip dysplasia. Some of the classic signs of joint disease include lameness, reluctance to walk or exercise, decreased appetite and discomfort or pain.

Many other pets can develop problems with their **Endocrine (hormone) system**. Common conditions include, but are not

limited to, diabetes, hyperthyroidism, hypothyroidism, hypoadrenocorticism and hyperadrenocorticism. This disease has a 5-10% prevalence in older pets. The noticeable changes include increased appetite without weight gain, vomiting, increased thirst, frequent urination and a change in energy level. If left untreated, these can result in heart and kidney failure.

Just like in humans, pets can develop cancer. An average of

50% of pets over 10 years old are affected with some form of cancer. Some of the more common cancers to affect older pets include skin cancer, brain cancer, liver cancer and lymphoma. Some of the more common signs are lumps, irritated skin, swollen lymph nodes, bleeding, vomiting and diarrhea. If left untreated, cancer can lead to organ failure and even death.

As with humans, as pets age sometimes their eyes can develop problems that affect their ability to see. Some of the more common eye conditions affecting the senior pet include cataracts, dry eye and glaucoma. Most eye diseases are inherited and often develop after 8 years of age. Signs commonly noted are gray/bluish hue at the center of the eye, excessive rubbing of the eyes, tearing and swollen eyes, red and irritated eyes. These conditions can lead to difficulty seeing, corneal ulcers, blindness and in extreme cases, loss of the eyes themselves.

Gastrointestinal system disorders are very common among both cats and dogs. Examples of these are inflammatory bowel disease, pancreatitis, cancer and colitis. Common signs include vomiting, diarrhea, weight loss and fluid gain. These signs can eventually progress to emaciation and potentially death if left untreated.

Your veterinarian may recommend an oral exam, x-rays, urinalysis, bloodwork, blood pressure check, ultrasound, EKG, biopsy or a fecal examination on your senior pet to correctly identify health risks before they become more evident. It is very important to schedule routine check-ups and speak up for your pet. Discuss any changes you've observed including weight, appetite elimination, behavior skin/coat and mobility to help the veterinarian determine if there are any health risks.



Always remember that early detection can save lives and prolong a great quality of your pet's life.

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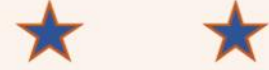
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The Journey of a thousand miles began with a few small steps

It seems like only yesterday when I fell down those accursed steps at Circus Bar and Grill on Friday April 11th 2014 ... a life



changer, a game changer! In only one week, “poof”, I had lost my right leg due to this freak and bizarre accident. This could not have happened to me ... hell no,

but the truth is that it did! What was I to do now with only one leg? I knew I had to work like hell to reclaim my independence, to reclaim my life!

When I calmed down, my thoughts returned to the advice of one of my lecturers during my Master’s planning classes, “Patrick, you have got to plan your work, and work your plan!” And so began my thousand mile journey to walk again. My wife and I planned and planned and planned again! Some of the initial ideas were so silly, were we to reveal them they would be the source of personal comic relief or the butt jokes of comedians on stage.



I had always been an active person and was determined to continue my physically active lifestyle. However, many times encountering challenges from performing simple daily activities

proved to be my undoing. This spurred me on even more. I have had to undergo intensive physio-therapy to rebuild my upper body strength. This was crucial in helping me perform the simplest of tasks such as getting into and out of my wheelchair, lifting my body to get in and out of bed, opening doors and getting into my vehicle.

Determined to walk again, my wife and I took our first small step. We hosted a series of fund-raising activities to procure a prosthetic leg. Our first fundraiser was held on June 13th 2014. We partnered with the Sandy Point Methodist Church, a number



of local artistes and business houses to pull off a “fantastic” show. Thanks to all including those individuals who paid for a ticket and gave it back so

that we could “re-sell it to someone else”, those who paid an extra \$5 or \$10 for a \$15 ticket, and individuals and companies that cooked the food, donated drinks, food, chairs and sound equipment as well as family members who assisted by selling food and drinks, keeping the gate and cleaning up after the concert. I came to tears when my son played the steelpan and my, otherwise, shy daughter sang publicly on stage for the first time in honour of their daddy.

Motivated by the success of the first fundraiser, we quickly followed up with a “Cards for a Cause” event and public auction at PJs Bar and Restaurant on June 30th 2014, a beach lime at Reggae Walks beach bar in collaboration with the St. Kitts and Nevis Hash House Harriers on August 30th 2014, a raffle with donated prizes that was drawn on Independence Day (Sept. 19th 2014) and a Charitable Gala Dinner at Marshall’s Restaurant on September 25th 2014. All of these events were well supported by those persons who attended as well as a number of business houses.



While all of these fundraisers were taking place, we took a second small step. We opened up a special account at National Bank that allowed individuals and groups to make donations via cash, cheques, wire transfers and credit card. This actually turned out to be a big step for monies poured in from friends and family in the diaspora, mostly the USA (particularly the members of the Sandy Point Benevolent Society) and from as far away as Africa and Europe and the Chancellor Hall fraternity of UWI’s Mona Campus, Jamaica). I must also express my gratitude to those individuals who transferred monies to the special account at National Bank as well as a number of anonymous donors.

Then came those nauseating questions! A number of close friends advised that our fundraising activities should be transparent. They expressed a fear that some persons would think that my family and I would “tief de money”. We responded to this concern by taking another small step. We asked Maurice Widdowson, a friend and well respected business man, to chair the Patrick Williams Walk Again Committee (PWWAC). Further, we approached Mr. Schneidman Warner, Accountant, to provide accounting, book-keeping and auditing services to the Fund. Once this level of comfort was provided, the donations increased significantly.

The next step was to create a website (<http://helppatrick.weebly.com>) allowing persons to make credit card donations to a special account created at the National Bank. We also placed a “goal meter” on the website to allow everyone to witness our progress. All of the services at the <http://helppatrick.weebly.com> website were provided by Rodney Brown and his eCaribbean Ltd. company. Rodney, kudos to

you! I am at this point largely because of your contribution. Nor can I ignore the contributions of Stachio Williams at SKNVibes and Clive Bachhus and Toni Frederick-Armstrong at WINNFM in advertising our fundraising events.

Another small step taken was involving a number of service organisations in our campaign to have me walking again. In this regard, a



huge thank you goes out to the Rotary Club of St. Kitts which was able to use its various networks and hook up with Rotarians in the USA. Special thanks to President Patricia Mourillon, Secretary Rhon Boddie, Charles Wilkin Q.C.,

other supportive members of Rotary (St. Kitts) as well as Rotarian Werner Hein in Miami for creating the necessary contacts with the Limbs for Life Foundation of Oklahoma and the Hanger Clinic of Miami to enable me to secure a prosthetic leg. I walked using my new prosthesis for the first time on December 24th 2014 ... the perfect Christmas gift. Nine months after my unfortunate incident, my initial “thousand mile journey” came to an end because of a few “small steps”. I am at the point where I am walking again, thanks to the benevolence of a long list of individuals, businesses and organisations in St. Kitts and Nevis and beyond. On behalf of the entire Williams family, thank you all so very, very, very much!!!

It was during my rehabilitation period that I became acutely aware of and recognised the challenges and obstacles that amputees, and other physically-challenged persons, in St. Kitts and Nevis face on a daily

basis. During this process, I came to realise and value the benefit of focused physio-therapy as it helped me not only physically, but also mentally. Further, it increased my self-esteem and confidence. I also found out that the mental aspects are as important as the physical changes that happen. It was during



my road to recovery that I became conscious of just how many persons in St. Kitts and Nevis were in my position. I had chronicled my experiences from depression, loneliness, fatigue and fundraising, and it was these experiences that inspired me to give something back – to assist other amputees in St. Kitts and Nevis – by creating a public charity.

Co-founder of this public charity, my wife, who has been beside me throughout my entire ordeal, had one desire – to see her husband “whole again”. This desire was the catalyst for the formation of a support group that caters to the spiritual, social, physical, recreational and financial needs of amputees in St. Kitts and Nevis. Allowing amputees to become “whole again” by returning to their former state of independence by becoming stronger physically and mentally and to find strength when they are at their lowest ebb is the overall mission of this new national charitable organisation – the Whole Again Foundation (WAF). Today, I have started a second 1,000 mile journey with a few small steps, and hope that you will join me in this new venture.

SALUTING THE TWO PILLARS EDUCATION PIONEERS IN SANDY POINT

Annie Maude Matilda Locker was born in Montserrat on the 2nd of August 1893. She was the eldest of three daughters of Michael Locker and his wife Ellen. Annie was in Montserrat and Antigua. At the age of twelve when her father joined the Leeward Islands Police Force was transferred to the police station. She attended the St. Michael Moravian School and in 1909 became a teacher at the Dieppe Bay Methodist School. It was there that she taught a class and was still tutored by the head teacher in preparation for the examination which had to be taken every year. This was a condition for anyone who wanted to remain in the service and advance to appointment as an Assistant Teacher. She was later transferred to **Sandy Point Girls' Primary School** in 1912.

She was able to win a scholarship to the Spring Gardens Teachers' College in Antigua. This College was a training school for female teachers in the Leeward Islands, and offered one scholarship annually to third-year pupil teachers. **Annie Locker** was appointed head teacher at Sandy Point Girls' School in January 1927. In 1937 Annie Locker married Milton Allen and took long leave to accompany him to New York. While in the United States she pursued studies in teaching and industrial arts at Columbia University. Mrs. Locker-Allen was painfully aware of the emphasis on theory and the lack of practical applications within the education system in St. Kitts. In order to compensate for this deficiency, she often provided at her own expense, the necessary material and equipment required to introduce Domestic Science and the different techniques of embroidery at her school in Sandy Point where she served until 1944.

It was during this time that she founded the first Girl Guides Company in the rural area. Her main objective was the development of self-worth among girls and young women. This she attempted to achieve by encouraging the girls entrusted to her care some of whom, from time to time, lived in her household, to participate in activities that broadened their horizons. She often warned them: "It is better to wear out than to rust out." The Third St. Kitts Guide Company was made up of predominantly country girls from working class backgrounds. Urged by their

founder, they attended every rally and meeting to keep abreast of developments in the world at large. In the days when private vehicles were few and public transportation practically non-existent, she along with her students, still managed to attend concerts and cultural events in Basseterre. Her good relationship with people of all classes usually guaranteed a ride home at the end of the evening. In Sandy Point and the surrounding communities, Mrs. Allen was a highly respected person and there were many households where decisions would not be taken unless she was consulted.

On the 6th January 1945, Mrs. Allen was appointed the head teacher of the Basseterre Girls' School which at the time had a roll of five hundred students and a staff of fifteen mostly pupil teachers. In 1951 Mrs. Allen became the first primary school teacher to be awarded an honorary title of Member of the British Empire (MBE). Two years later she retired from active teaching but social and church work continued to keep her busy.

In 1969, when her husband became the first national of the state to serve in the position as Governor she was able to support him in his official duties. Her excellent conversational skills, her refined good manners and taste for good clothes stood her in good stead. Sir Milton and Lady Allen brought a special dignity to the office and this was warmly appreciated by the citizens. Former colleagues were not forgotten. On the 6th March 1975, Lady Allen realized her desire to entertain teachers at Government House. Among those attending the "at home" were several retired teachers who had been students of Lady Allen.

Some of her pupils were, Ann Revan, Lyra Ramus, Enid Hanley, Pearline Warner, Erminie Buchanan, and Edna Tyrrell.

SALUTING THE TWO PILLARS EDUCATION PIONEERS IN SANDY POINT

John Edgar Hanley was born in Nevis in 1880. In 1902 he arrived in Sandy Point and became the Head Master of the *Sandy Point Boys' School*. Edgar Hanley a self taught man never spared any effort to gain new knowledge so that he could impart to his young pupils of Sandy Point. Apart from the basic Reading, Writing and Arithmetic, Mr. Hanley was able to teach his students, geometry, algebra and trigonometry. His music classes were well organized as he was able to write read and teach “tonic sol-fa” He was able to collaborate and organize concerts with Mrs. Locker-Allen whose husband sent printed music sheets from New York.

He was known to be a disciplinarian. And there have been several accounts where he administered corporal punishment on some of his pupils' parents who dared to challenge him. He spared no effort in preparing his students for the annual scholarship exams. Some of his students were forced by him to repeat the final year of school (7th standard) because they were not able to find work. In other cases he made them his assistants.

While we do not have much written account of Mr. Hanley as the head teacher of the Sandy Point Boys' School, his influence is ever present in the lives he impacted, and the domino effect that his contribution is still evolving. John Edgar Hanley served as principal of the Sandy Point Boys' School until 1945, when he was transferred to the Basseterre Boys' School. By this time the “powers that be” realized that the success rate at the Sandy Point Boys' School was not being achieved in Basseterre. Listed below are some of his students:-

Salutations are in order to these two individuals who created the first generation of scholars from Sandy Point.
